Hessle Staff provide stacks of gifts to Redstacks Care home!



The care home was overwhelmed by the thought and care that had gone into the not only the gifts but also the lovely cards, messages and wrapping.




Head of Year 9 Updates

Oskar J, 9C2



Boys:

- The boys have a good grasp of basic trampolining skills by now, focusing on refining technique, timing, creativity in their routines and learning some more advanced skills such as somersaults. They have worked on strength and flexibility as well, making it a nice foundation for their physical fitness.
- Now that they've switched to rugby, the boys are diving into more complex aspects of the game, such as tackling techniques, passing patterns, and strategy. They will focus on developing game awareness and fitness, as rugby requires a mix of endurance, speed, and strength. It's also a great opportunity for leadership and teamwork, as they understand the importance of communication on the field.

Girls:

- The girls have now developed a strong understanding of the key badminton skills, such as footwork, precision in serving, and anticipating shots. They have moved on to more competitive games, refining their technique and strategy for better court positioning and rallies.
- Transitioning to basketball brings a focus on enhancing their ball-handling skills, shooting accuracy, and understanding team plays. 
Year 9 boys lost in the Humberside Cup against South Hunsley but was a very good performance.

Maths


In Year 9 Mathematics, we have been focusing on the topics of Transformations and Angles in Parallel Lines. During this unit, students have explored a variety of key concepts that are fundamental to understanding geometric shapes and their properties.

Transformations

 Students have learned about different types of transformations, including rotations, reflections and enlargements. They have gained hands-on experience by performing transformations on shapes and have developed the skills to recognize and describe these transformations in 2D contexts.

Angles in Parallel Lines:

- We have also worked on understanding the relationship between angles formed by parallel lines. Students have explored corresponding angles, alternate angles, and co-interior angles, and will learn how to use these properties to solve geometric problems and prove theorems.
- We encourage you to support your child's learning at home by discussing these topics and helping them with any homework or practice tasks. If you have any questions about the content being covered, please feel free to reach out.
- Thank you for your ongoing support in your child's education. We look forward to seeing their progress in this exciting area of mathematics.







Upcoming Events/Curriculum:



These students are setting the pace in their respective year groups and contributing significantly to their House's success.


